

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Minutes of the Club Meeting from Tuesday, January 19, 2021

President Dan Contento called the meeting to order at 6:35pm. A total of 16 members participated at some point during the meeting (see attached screenshot). The meeting opened with the President sharing some thoughts and ideas of what will happen

Airplanes Of the Aces - Tex Hill

In the gloomy days after Pearl Harbor, when the Japanese were running roughshod over everybody in the Pacific theater, there was one flicker of light in China that gave Americans hope that the Empire's forces might not be invincible after all.





A group of US pilots, who became known as the Flying Tigers, hired themselves out to the Chinese government as mercenaries and were having success against the Japanese army's air force.

One of the leading pilots of that group was David "Tex" Hill. Like many of the recruited airmen, who were officially known as the American Volunteer Group (AVG), Hill was already trained as a combat pilot in the US military but got tired of waiting for America to enter the war and jumped at the chance to see action immediately.





Their leader was the maverick airpower advocate Claire Chennault who had been bounced out of the Army Air Corps for his strident support of increasing US aerial combat capability.

They engaged the Japanese Army Air Force flying early versions of the Curtiss P-40 which had been rejected by the British as obsolete. Compared to the nimble Japanese fighters it was heavy

slow and awkward, but Chennault devised a strategy that took advantage of its strengths - greater firepower, armor protection and high diving speed. Soon they were carving up the Japanese flight formations with a tactic they called "zoom and boom".





My model of Tex Hill's P-40E, the newer version that arrived in spring 1942, was an excellent Hasegawa kit that I incorporated into a diorama of the primitive conditions that the Flying Tigers often were forced to work from.

I used a resin model of the Allison engine in the P-40, cut the engine panel off and borrowed some figures from another kit to give the scene some interest and activity. The fuel drums and ammo boxes were also borrowed from resin cargo sets.



Finishing off the display is an information card that includes a brief bio of Tex Hill and his signature on one of Bruce Doyle's ace cards. It's a fitting tribute to one of the first American aces of WW2.

Doug Spinney's M-109A6 Paladin (1:35 scale) by Tamiya/Italeri







Paladin M109A6 is a cannon artillery system with self-propelled howitzer (SPH)

developed by the ground system division of United Defense LP (now BAE Systems Land and Armaments) and manufactured at the Paladin Production Operation centre at Chambersburg, Pennsylvania. Paladin was first fielded in 1994, is operational with the United States Army and the Israeli Army and has been selected by the Kuwait and Taiwan. In June 1999, the US Army received the last of the 950 Paladin M109A6 that it ordered. Seven systems were ordered in July 2000 for the US Army National Guard and a further 18 systems in January 2002. The US Army received the first Paladin M109A6 upgraded to M109A7 standard in April 2015. The Paladin artillery system is operated by a crew of four, a commander, a driver, a gunner and a loader. The crew are able to receive mission data via a secure voice and digital communications system, compute the firing data, automatically unlock the cannon from the travel lock, point the cannon and fire, and move to a new location without external technical assistance. The M109A6 Paladin fires the first round from the move within 60 seconds. The 'shoot and scoot' capability protects the crew from counterbattery fire. Paladin was used in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom in March / April 2003 and in the continuing operations in Iraq, including Operation Al Fajr in Fallujah in November 2004.

BAE Systems Land and Armaments supplied 219 modification kits for US Army Paladins, which enable the use of the modular artillery charge system (MACS) and the 155mm precision-guided extended-range XM92 Excalibur projectile being developed by Raytheon and Bofors Defense of Sweden (a BAE Systems subsidiary). Deliveries began in 2005.






He played basically the same character in Superman II (1980) although his name is never mentioned (He was referred to simply as "sheriff").
