I managed to get the tank painted, and added a few free floating gas cans on the turret to cover up my airbrushing mistakes. I figured nobody would notice, and I packed up my model and headed to my first Gator Modelers meeting. I placed my model on the table with all the other models and the first thing someone said to me was that tanks don't have free floating gas cans. That's just Great. I looked at all the models on the table and considered sneaking mine off the table and heading out the door. Luckily my wife was with me and insisted that we stay. When it came time to talk about our models I was terrified, I had to get up and talk about something that everyone in that room had perfected 50 years ago. Why 50 years ago? Because almost everyone in the room had been building models since childhood. I seemed to have missed that part of growing up. (Although over the years I've been told more than a few time that I need to grow up, but that's yet another Prez Sez).

Why the title *The Four Club Dilemma*? Over the last five years I have managed to join four model clubs, each one unique on its own. And each one has a build of the month. That means that in order to stay with the theme for the month I

Frank Builds a Tank

How do you keep track of more than 600 parts? How do you build a track when even experienced builders roll their eyes? How did I end up deciding to do this?

Tracy, despite his service in the Air Force, was a tank guy, so it seemed logical to build a tank from his huge stash. One problem - I don't build tanks. Talk about getting out of your comfort zone.



Problem #2 - I apparently bought the wrong tank for a novice to build. Rather than pick something from Tamiya, which would have been easier, I wanted to build a Sherman, which led me to this Dragon kit. I have since learned that Dragon kits have a reputation for difficulty that should have sent me running in the opposite direction.


Rather than bore you with a blow by blow description of my struggles, here are some of the low-lights..






Frank Builds a Tank

After assembling the vast multitude of wheels, I was confronted with this diagram that



was supposed to tell me where to place the return rollers. There was no indication on the tank hull itself where the rollers should go so I just eyeballed them.

In my defense I must say that I have built a lot of model kits. I am usually able to figure out how parts go together.



These were the most vague and unhelpful instructions I have ever encountered. I was totally unable to figure out how the track links were supposed to fit. Nothing on the parts or the instructions indicated where or how the tread and the little nib were designed to connect.

Finally, out of frustration, I accepted the kind offer of Doug Spinney to give me a pair of rubber tracks he had, which saved me many days of head scratching.



The whole experience had me feeling like the Chinese man in Tiananmen Square back in 1989. Me against the tank and the tank won.








